

#### From the President's Desk

To my fellow NYB Members,

For those who don't know me, my name is Andrew Cotraccia. I'm 35 years old and I live in the greater Rochester area. I have a wife, Heather, whom I've been with since I was 16 years old, a daughter Layla who is turning 5 and a son Johnathan who is turning 2 this year. For the past 21 years, I've worked for a medical device company that specializes in manufacturing sterility assurance products and PPE like face masks and face shields. I attended NYB youth camp when I was 14 years



old and received my bowhunter certification. I attended NYB's youth hunt shortly after that and have been serving NYB in an official capacity for the past 17 years, starting out as an Ontario County Representative in Region 8, as Advertising Editor and Editor of *FullDraw* Magazine, Secretary, 2nd VP and most recently, VP under Al Bottari. I also come from a NYB family. My Dad, Gary, served as Past NYB President, among many other positions. NYB has been a part of my life for as long as I can remember and I'm honored to be President of New York Bowhunters. I assure you that we will remain focused on promoting and protecting bowhunting. I also hope to inspire and motivate more younger people to join and serve NYB. We've taken so much enjoyment while hunting, it's only right to give back and NYB is the perfect outlet for that.

I also want to thank NYB's leadership team headed by Al Bottari over the past 4 years. I can assure you all there isn't a group of hunters more dedicated to promoting and protecting bowhunting in NYS than NYB's Board of Directors. No one serves NYB because they have extra time and energy to spare. Having to balance a demanding full-time job, a wife and 2 children, and leading a nonprofit organization isn't only amazing, it's exceptional and I want to thank Al and his family for the last 4 years. Leading NYB isn't easy and the time commitment and sacrifices you've made are greatly appreciated.

This past year has been challenging for a lot of reasons; most notably from the devastating impacts of the Covid-19 virus. Our fellow members, their extended families and our organization have not been immune. We obviously were not able to have our 2020 Banquet, our youth camps had to be cancelled, and our normal business and fundraising activities had to be scaled back significantly. I wish all of our members a healthy and safe 2021.

With all the changes and impacts of Covid on our NYB family and to the NYB coffers, nothing seemed to change in Albany. Once again, the NYS Budget Bill for 2021 had language in it which would have expanded the use of crossbows throughout the entirety of the early archery season. Mark Twain famously wrote that: "politicians and diapers need to be changed often and for the same reason." This year, above all previous years, was most challenging with Boss Cuomo and his Caporegime looking for any opportunity to take more money from the people who live and work here. Along with the political pressures, we've seen several major state and national gun and hunting organizations supporting expanded crossbow use because it's politically correct to do so. But once again, NYB's members rose to the occasion with waves of emails, phone calls, and letters to our Legislators and we stopped the crossbow push dead in its tracks. Make no mistake about it, the fight to expand crossbow hunting in NYS has never been and will never be about expanding opportunities for hunters. It's all about making money and selling crossbows. How can anyone look at the modern crossbow and think it should be in any bowhunting season? For example, the Ravin R500E can be cocked and uncocked using a battery powered system, shoots a bolt at 500 fps, and is 3.6" axle to axle when cocked. The Excalibur Twin Strike has 2 sets of limbs, and two triggers which allows it to be pre-cocked and pre-loaded with 2 bolts. The PSE TAC-15 is built upon the lower receiver of an AR-15 rifle, and boasts of 1" groups at 100 yards. And the Ten Point Vapor Garmin XERO crossbow comes equipped with a Garmin Xero range finding scope. This scope range finds game out to 250 yards and sets an aiming point out to 175 yards to name just a few. NYS's bowhunters will always be in the minority when it comes to the gun hunters who want to use a crossbow to become a 2-season hunter. The work that has been done by our organization over

the past 30 years has been recognized throughout the country and proves that quality trumps quantity every time.

Lastly, I want to thank everyone who attended our Annual Banquet and Rendezvous over the weekend of May 1st at Sunny Hill Resort and to the NYB Banquet Committee for all their hard work in preparation and execution. I sincerely hope that everyone was able to enjoy a relaxing weekend. The 2021 banquet also marked NYB's 30th Anniversary. A huge milestone for any volunteer organization! NYB was formed in the Spring of 1991 when several bowhunters from around the state gathered together to discuss forming a statewide organization. That discussion led to New York Bowhunters becoming the premier bowhunting organization in NYS 30 years later. If you know someone who bow hunts that's not a member, sign them up or share this link with them. They need to become a member. Tell them about the amazing things we do, about the thousands of kids we've put through our youth camps that became certified to bow hunt for free, our support of the North American Bowhunting Coalition, our support of the men and women serving overseas through our Camo to Camo program, our work on adaptive equipment for elderly and physically disabled bowhunters, or our support of the National Archery in Schools Program. Or Legislatively, how we successfully lobbied to lower the legal bowhunting age in NYS to 12 years old, how we help expand DMP use for bowhunters to include the entire season, how we prevented the DEC from placing a muzzleloader season into or before Southern Zone archery-only season, how we successfully pushed to open the Southern Zone Archery season on October 1st, and how we helped extend the Northern Zone Archery season by 1 week, or how we helped reduce the discharge distance of a bow from 500 to 150 to name just a few. If you hunt with a bow, you need to become a member to promote and protect your rights in the woods.

### Dear NDA,

My name is Al Bottari, and I am the President of New York Bowhunters, Inc. I am writing to your organization today in regards to your involvement in New York State hunting related endeavors.

I can see that within this past year the NDA has sent letters to the NYS Executive, NYS Senate Majority Leader, and NYS Assembly Speaker, as well as a nationwide alert regarding the NYS Budget Bill. Article X within the NYS Budget Bill had several provisions, including lowering the big game hunting age from 14 to 12 years of age, and full inclusion crossbow expansion.

NYB has always supported getting the age lowered, and we were influential in getting the archery age lowered over a decade ago, without all of the restrictions that encompass the "pilot program." NYB, for several reasons, as described below, does not endorse full inclusion crossbow expansion.

The modern crossbow offers a multitude of distinct advantages over a true, handdrawn, handheld bow. This superior implement becomes more advanced with each passing year, as is evident by the recent crop, which includes the Ravin R500E, Ten Point Garmin XERO, Lancehead F1 limbless, and Excalibur Twin Strike.

NYS has around 700,000 licensed hunters. Our bowhunters alone number more than some states' entire hunting populations. At one time, 1 out of 17 NYS residents hunted. So, naturally, the crossbow manufacturers want full inclusion to take advantage and entice firearms hunters to hunt with a crossbow. For over 2 decades I have heard their mantras: "Become a 2-season hunter," "Use a platform that you are accustomed to."

That is where the problem lies. The archery season was long fought for, and it was established that it does take longer to get into close range and to kill a deer with archery tackle (the national average is 15 yards), than with

a firearm. The ability to be pre-cocked and pre-loaded, just as a long gun, should nullify it from consideration in the archery season alone. Also, every crossbow comes equipped with a scope, and is touted by the manufacturers for its long range shooting capability.

The crossbow is already legal to use during the last 2 weeks of Archery Season, and then continually through the Regular (Firearms) Season; the opportunity to hunt with a crossbow is already in effect.

What is most troubling to me is that a national organization is getting involved with a state issue. Why didn't the NDA reach out to NYB, the state's bowhunting organization? It would've been a nice gesture to ask for our input, to open a dialogue and discuss the issues.

We WERE contacted by several former QDMA, now NDA members, who voiced their displeasure with the NDA's actions. Some were so disturbed, that they vowed to not renew their NDA dues because of those actions, and they sent letters of non-support to disavow the NDA involvement to legislators in Albany.

While not every member can agree on all positions that an organization takes, transparency to the membership is vital and critical to its longevity.

NYB has always remained neutral and deferred to the NYS organization that would be affected by any legal amendment to NYS Environmental Conservation Law. Just as we would never seek Pope and Young or the Professional Bowhunters Society, both national archery organizations, to get involved, no national organization should trespass into NYS matters.



# REGION REPORTS

The weather is getting warmer, which means we are one step closer to October! I hope everyone had a safe and healthy winter. As I write this, we are days away from our 30th annual Banquet. As I will be there with my family, I look forward to meeting and socializing with our other members.

Statistics can be considered boring to most, unless you are talking about hunting. After browsing through some information released by the DEC from this past 2020 season, there were numerous topics I found intriguing. As some of you may know, here on Long Island we are bow only with the exception of a short special firearm season (permit required). That being said, in 2020 we had between 2-3 bucks taken per square mile. Antlerless deer were in the range of 2-4 per square mile. Here in Suffolk county we had an estimated take of

approximately
1,861 bucks
and 1,909
does, which
is not much
compared to
other counties.
All in all, as a state,
bowhunters were responsible
for a harvest of 64,537 deer total in
2020. Let's keep up the good work!

Coupled with the fact that the DEC lied to us last year in our Deer Plan (FOIL) inquiry, it is my opinion they purposely held off releasing the news of this crossbow death in order to not jeopardize the full inclusion of crossbow language in the Budget Bill.

Congratulations to Rafael Bueno whose 2020 Rockland buck gross scored 153! Even after deductions, it easily scored over the P&Y minimum. There are plenty of 3D opportunities going on every week throughout the Region 3 area, many at the following NYB booster clubs: High Woods, North Dutchess & Ti Yogi. And also, Cos Cob, although in CT, quite convenient to many of us here in R3. Check their websites for dates, etc.

I spent the month of April in the Texas Hill Country prepping my land and preparing my NY exit. I did manage to start my trek for the Turkey Grand Slam. I hunted successfully for my first Rio Grande Turkey. Having taken many Eastern birds, taking my first Rio was quite the experience. The incredible iridescence on their feathers, the light beige tail perimeter and the monster spurs they produce (mine was a jake, nubs for spurs with 3" beard) makes the Rio Turkey highly sought after. There are several turkey subspecies in the Americas; the Merriams, Goulds and Osceola in addition to the Rio and Eastern. The MOST sought after turkey is the Ocellated found only in the Yucatan Peninsula, Mexico. They are on my list as well. I also got to do a bunch of hog hunting/ killing in Texas. I hunted them at night and also trapped them in large 30' steel traps for land owners who are recipients of the destruction that these invasive hogs cause. Trap doors can be closed via cell phone, once targeted game is seen in pic on cell phone. A neat set up.

Nature has a way of setting the balance in Texas, too. Texas had a deep freeze for a few weeks in Feb and thousands of free ranging Axis (also known as Chital) and other exotics froze to death. The Native Texas whitetail took the freeze in stride and got through it. Axis and Blackbuck are from India and are not made for the cold. The die off was incredible. Axis can have 3 births in 2 years, so they repopulate faster than the native whitetail, are larger body/antler wise and become dominant at food sources, hurting the native whitetail populations. Nature took care of that and many competing non-native species died off giving the whitetail a better chance at reclaiming the land lost to escaped free range non-native competing species. Ain't nature great or what?

The Banquet...If you missed it, you missed a really good time. Put it on your list for next year. The Friday night BBQ was perfect. The wind had something to say but Sunny Hill (incredible hosts BTW) had the pavilion protected and the meet and greet went well. There were some new faces and many old faces and we missed the ones who could not attend. Good to see all of you. Bob Brown's wife Michele made some of THE most delicious desserts I have ever tasted or seen! Thank you again Michele. The Saturday events again were challenging because of the wind. The novelty shoots and the 3D shoots took place and the NYB gang toughed it out and made it all happen. The bucket/can raffles were loaded with all kinds of great stuff. This part of the banquet never disappoints. Amazing variety of stuff we all need and want. Congrats to all the winners.

#### WESTCHESTER COUNTY REPORT

As we enjoy the long stretch between seasons, I hope everyone enjoyed a successful Spring Turkey hunt, and I would like congratulate all the Bowhunters who hunted in Westchester County for a successful 2020 big game season! The annual Deer harvest in Westchester was higher than in 2019. With the record number of hunter safety course registrants in 2020, we anticipated a lot more hunters in the fall season and the increase in the harvest supports that some new hunters may have filled their first big game tags in 2020. Westchester saw an

increase across the board with 677 bucks harvested compared to 647 last year, and a total harvest of 1,282 deer compared to 1,193 deer in 2019. Also, two black bears were harvested in North Salem and in Pound Ridge, compared to one in 2019.

I will be readily checking in with the local bow shops to inquire if any 3D tournaments will be hosted in the county this summer, so feel free to contact me for more information. The Blue Mountain sportsman center also has a permanent 3D course as part of its archery center.

Best wishes and quick recovery to Doug Erickson, President, Westchester Bowhunters Association, as he continues in his rehab from his accident last winter. I hear you've got an elk out west giving you motivation!

#### ORANGE COUNTY REPORT

Interesting 2020 harvest data has been reported from Orange County. As we all know, due to the DEC shutting down the live safety courses and allowing an online course, a record number of hunters hit the woods last year. This is probably the biggest reason for such a drastic increase in the bear harvest. In 2020, there were a total 176 bears taken in Orange County compared to only 89 the previous year! Surprisingly the total Orange County deer take in 2020 was 5,784 compared to 6,046 in 2019. Although this drop contradicts the "additional hunter theory" one must consider that the EHD outbreak might have been much larger than originally reported. What is disturbing is that although the DEC knew about the outbreak, they did not slow down their DMP sale. Why would they? They are still bragging about the additional revenue all the new hunters brought in. Keep this in mind; when so many new hunters hit the woods without a knowledgeable, passionate, ethical instructor guiding them, there is another stat of concern that might be a bi-product of "online only" training. In Orange County, although 2,529 bucks aged a year-and-a-half or more were killed there were also another 337 male fawns killed (also 2,540 adult females and 378 female fawns). With all the effort the DEC is putting into trying to influence hunters to let young deer pass and the surplus of DMPs, coupled with new hunters and poor training, this might be working against the "Let em go, let em grow" dictum we've been hearing so much of. Conservation only goes so far when revenue is at stake.





### THE RUT ZONE

"Oh My Gosh" uttered from my mouth as I glanced across an alfalfa field. Regaining my composure, I eased my truck back on to the road. Even without my spotting scope he stood 'head and antlers' above the two other subordinate bucks he was with.

It was August 23, and I was on my way to meet a hunting buddy, Cy Weichert, and scout a new area just down the road. That's when I saw "him."

I was excited to finally be able to use my spotting scope, truck window

mount, mini tripod set up. It's the gadget I told my wife I couldn't live without. After wiping off three years of dust, I set it up.

There he was again, only this time he was four times closer, thanks to my 4X scope. His velvet was wrapped so tight it looked like it was shrink wrapped. He had a beautiful seven point rack, wide and tall. Fortunately for me the story gets even better. This buck was munching on alfalfa a mere 150 yards from property I have permission to hunt on.

The strategy to take this buck came to me fairly quick. Of course, my strategies for taking a particular buck usually sound good and look good on paper, but the one element I can't control, the buck, doesn't cooperate! Would this time be different?

The following Saturday I was in the woods carrying my saw, tree pegs and a 'game plan.' I knew where I had to go. It was a spot that I had told myself over the years to hang a stand, but failed to do so. The area was the shape




and size of a football field. I appropriately named it the "rut zone." The majority of the area was scrub apples, with one exception, a lone maple tree situated at one end.

The scrubby area was ideal for rutting bucks. Every year, two or more doe family units would make it their home. I figured that they would be the ultimate 'buck lure.'

As I left the area, I made a vow not to return until the rut was in full swing. Knowing the potential of this stand site made it extremely difficult to stay away. I did manage to stay out of that old maple for quite a while. One day, while I was checking the perimeter of the "rut zone," I noticed the usual doe tracks going in and out. That didn't excite me too much, but the huge tracks mulching the soil and covering the doe tracks did! The "rut zone" was kicking into high gear.

It was a Monday afternoon and I was hunting just down the road from the "rut zone," about one mile, "as the crow flies." As I eased myself into my stand, I could feel it: the rut was on. In a matter of a few minutes I was about to



experience one of my best hunts ever. It happened so fast, two does exploded from the brush behind me, ears pinned back, tails tucked and eyes that screamed rape. In the next half hour, I saw five bucks grunting and chasing does around my stand. I had to laugh as I watched those poor boys striking out with the ladies. A good shot never presented itself, but the hunt still ranked as one of my best ever. I had seen and heard enough that evening and knew it was time to hunt the "rut zone."


The next morning I awoke before my alarm went off. I had been waiting for this day for almost three months. As I was approaching the old maple, it reminded me of when I was a kid going down the stairs on Christmas morning. Just like back then I wondered what would end up under the tree. The anticipation was great.

I checked my watch, it was 7:25 a.m. Looking up, I caught movement straight ahead 60 yards out. It was a mature doe heading down a trail that would parallel me at 40 yards. I wasn't too concerned until I saw what was following her. It was him, the buck that I was after. Excitement turned to utter disappointment as I watched him follow the doe as

she would take him out of bow range. As I was letting out a sigh, the buck stopped, turned towards me and started heading my way. It must have been divine intervention! He stopped broadside ten yards away...with a tree covering his vitals! My heart was working overtime as I waited for him to take another step. The wait wasn't long as he stepped around the tree and moved towards me. At six paces, I let the arrow fly. It found its mark and the buck exploded out of sight.

I finally was able to finish that sigh I started when I first saw the buck. As I sat down, I thought about what just happened. "My plan worked as I designed it to," I thought. Then I remembered when the buck was at the crossroads. If I was a betting man, I would have put my cash on him following the doe, but instead he turned and came by me. "I can't take all the credit," I said to myself. I realized right then and there that Someone higher than me should get the credit for me taking a beautiful buck in the "rut zone."

# **Legislative Report - Summer 2021**

This was quite a year legislatively for New York Bowhunters, Inc. (NYB). We faced a political crisis like never before. When the 2021 New York State (NYS) Budget Bill was released it included the full inclusion of the crossbow into the archeryonly seasons and the lowering of the big game firearms hunting age from 14 to 12. Through all of our membership's unprecedented efforts, which included telephone calls, emails, faxes, and delivered mail, we were able to have the crossbow language removed. NYB cannot thank our membership enough for the monumental effort you achieved as well as a big "thank you" to our outgoing President, Al Bottari, for his outstanding leadership in this as well as many past efforts.

Supporters of the crossbow full inclusion portion of the budget bill included the NYS Department of Environmental Conservation (DEC) and the National Deer Association (NDA), a national organization that is a merger between the Quality Deer Management Association and the National Deer Alliance. The NDA chose to get involved with NYS management matters by sending support letters to key NYS legislative leaders as well as issuing a nationwide alert to all of their members. NYB took great offense to this trespass as the NDA failed to open a dialog with NYB on this issue. Please view NYB's response letter to NDA in this issue of Fulldraw for more details.

Something very disturbing occurred after full inclusion of the crossbow portion of the Budget Bill was defeated. The DEC published that there was a crossbow death in NYS last year. The timing of reporting this incident fits in with the DEC's continuing efforts to assist the crossbow lobby in obtaining full inclusion of the crossbow. NYB has been receiving reports from the NYS Environmental Conservation Officers regarding criminal activity and hunting accidents for many




years with many crossbow violations reported annually. Over the last two years, there have been ZERO crossbow incidents reported. No accidents, no poaching, no hunting over bait, no nothing! One can only speculate that this oversight was an effort by the DEC to hide illegal crossbow incidents from the public in their continuing effort for full inclusion. On December 8, 2020 a forty year old Onondaga County hunter with ten years of hunting experience was killed by a self-inflicted crossbow bolt being shot into his chest when attempting to haul his pre-cocked and pre-loaded crossbow up to his tree stand. No bowhunter has ever killed themselves with a self-inflicted arrow being shot into their chest. This is what happens when you can get away with just reading a half page blurb in the hunting guide on crossbow safety, sign it, cut it out, and carry it in your pocket.

The section of the budget bill that would lower the big game firearms hunting age passed with restrictions. This is a two year "Pilot Program" that will be terminated in 2024 if not reapproved. The eight counties of Westchester, Nassau, Suffolk and the five boroughs of New York City are NOT eligible to participate in this program. The remaining upstate NYS counties must each pass a local law in order to participate. Those counties that do NOT pass an approval law will NOT be allowed to participate in this "Pilot Program." Licensed junior firearms hunters (ages 12 & 13) can hunt deer (not bear) with a muzzleloader, crossbow, rifle or shotgun. They must be accompanied by an adult hunter, aged 21 years or older, with at least three years of hunting experience, and that person must be a parent, legal guardian, or a mentor with written parent consent. Both junior hunter and adult hunter must be together at all times, wear fluorescent orange or pink and hunt from the ground (no elevated stands). NYB has ALWAYS supported lowering the age for all junior hunters. NYB was instrumental in getting the junior bowhunting age lowered from age 14 to 12 in 2011 with the removal of restrictions from the original legislative bill that would have required youth archers to wear fluorescent colors, hunt only on the ground and not be able to hunt bear. Once again the NYB leadership was actively involved with the NYS legislature in delivering the goods.

We are still waiting on the final outcome of the DEC's 2021-2030 Deer Management Proposal. About the only good news for bowhunters in this DEC plan is that it proposes to allow bowhunting in Nassau County. Similar to past attempts the DEC is proposing to implement a mid-September antlerless, FIREARMS (muzzleloader) hunt prior to the opening of the archery-only seasons. In this plan the DEC officially states that they want full inclusion of the crossbow during the archery-only seasons. Another bad idea from a safety standpoint, especially during firearms and crossbow seasons, is the proposal to expand legal hunting hours from 1/2 hour before sunrise to 1/2 hour before sunset.







# Sage Award PRESENTATION May 2021 PRESENTATION

As we all know, so many people donate so much of their time, energy and various means of support to make NYB the organization it is. Although impossible to thank everyone, NYB does try and acknowledge some of those who have stood out with various forms of recognition and service awards. There is one award that is saved for only those members that have distinguished themselves beyond what even the most active members have accomplished. It is not given out on a regular basis, nor does serving as a BOD, Officer or even President in and of itself qualify a candidate. In NYB's 30 year history, there have only been 9 previous recipients of the Osage Award.

Through the ages, "Osage" has become synonymous with the bow and arrow. The French named it "bois'd arc" or "wood of the bow." Some of its outstanding qualities are:

- **Toughness**—the ability to resist damage under stress
- **Durability**–the ability to withstand the test of time
- **Stability**—the ability to be unaffected by outside influence like scorching heat or bitter cold

These same qualities when applied to an NYB member would result in someone who has given their heart and soul to protect bowhunting and serve the NYB membership. The selection is made by past Osage Award winners and must be agreed upon unanimously.

Ed Gorch was honored as the 10th Osage Award winner at the Banquet. He joined NYB the first year of its organization. Shortly thereafter he became the Greene County Rep. He eventually moved into the Region 4 Rep's position. Throughout his NYB tenure, he regularly attends his county federation meetings and was usually the lone voice in defending NYB's positions in a, more often than not, hostile environment. He has served as a Board of Director in NYB for the last thirteen years. He chairs the Camo to Camo program and is a member of the Legislative, Membership and Banquet Committees.

NYB owes our legislative accomplishments to many dedicated BOD members, past and present, but over the past decade, no NYB member has spent more time in Albany's halls and offices than Ed Gorch.

Ed is the current Region 4 Youth Camp director where he has been an active staff member since it began. When NYB was promoting NASP, Ed held meetings in several local school districts in order to educate and promote that program with school staff. Annually, Ed is a regular fixture at the Greene County Youth Fair, exposing kids to archery and promoting NYB.

Ed travels from his home here in Greenville, NY to outdoor shows throughout the northeast. Shows in Harrisburg, Pennsylvania, Suffern, NY and Springfield, Massachusetts will find Ed "shaking down" all who he can. Ed is not only getting hunts and items donated for NYB but convincing Outfitters to give NYB free hunts for our "Camo to Camo" program so that a deserving wounded soldier can enjoy the outdoor hunting experience.

Ed was the founder and driving force behind NYB's "Camo to Camo" program. Over more than the last decade, Ed has organized many hunts for wounded soldiers. Ed has been on every one of those hunts, often assembling sometimes as many as a dozen or more other NYB members to accompany America's hero servicemen.

In addition to the "Camo to Camo" hunts,



for over a decade, NYB has sent approximately 15,000 pounds of various small gifts in hundreds of boxes, to hundreds of US military troops serving in the Middle East. This program exists because of the generosity of all of the generous donors, but Ed makes it all happen. And every box contains a letter saying "...thank you for your service and sacrifice..." from the members of NYB.


Ed was the key player in the Albany Outdoor Sports Show until it closed many years ago. Since then he has continued to be an instrumental member at the Rockland Show. This show regularly brings in well over a hundred NYB applications each year. That show is almost 100 miles away from his home, yet Ed is there all four days and is such a large part of that success. A few years ago, Ed heard about a new show starting up in Dutchess County in Region 3. Even though Ed lives in Region 4, which is 40 miles away, he set up and ran the NYB booth. That first year over 40 new members were signed up there. Once shows start opening up again Ed will be back at all of them. If we had one member in every region that did a fraction of what Ed has done, our membership would have tripled in the last ten years.

Since moving the annual banquet to Sunny Hill six years ago, Ed has served as the main logistics person. This move allowed us to recapture the "Rendezvous" feeling that NYB's early banquets started out as. A large part of that is due to the outdoor events, and of course the 3D range, all of which have Ed's fingerprints all over them. And in the middle of the craziness that accompanies the running of an event like this, if a member needed to chase a Turkey this weekend, it was of course Ed that found them a piece of woods.

Two years ago, Ed almost singlehandedly helped NYB fulfill a goal which remained elusive for many Board of Directors and Officers. Changing NYB's status to a 501(c)(3) would open additional opportunities for fundraising, but we were never able to overcome two obstacles. One; of finding an attorney willing to do it. And two; the prohibitive cost associated with this venture. Ed reached out to Albany University School of Law in an attempt to convince them this would be a great project for their students. Ed's presentation made such a great impression on the supervising professor that gentleman offered to work on this project personally and NYB achieved yet another huge milestone.

Ed has gone way beyond what he is asked to do for NYB. Any one of Ed's accomplishments stands out on its own. But when you look at the overall impact Ed Gorch has had on NYB, his efforts are unparalleled. He works tirelessly for NYB year-round and is most deserving of this most prestigious Osage award.



**Hunting season has started.** Our hunting season has commenced—at long last! A couple of Air Force officers came in and took 9 wildebeest, 2 impala, two kudu bulls and an eland in two-and-a-half days. Hope the rest of the season goes as well. They left with well over a ton of meat.

**Buffalo hunting–Africa's Black Death.** We are able to offer cheap Cape buffalo hunting: females only at US \$3,500. The trophy bulls go for \$10,000 minimum, so this is quite cheap. It is the same hunt, the same thrill and the same experience, but the animal is not a trophy bull. Nothing prevents you, however, from making a trophy mount of an old female. Weapon to be used: rifle or compound bow. Bowhunters should, however, be able to draw at least 80 pounds. This offer is for this season only. Let us know if you are interested.

**Covid-19.** We noticed with much concern that the Biden administration is advising against visiting South Africa. The main issue is that the variant found in South Africa is considered a variant of concern.

However, the experience in South Africa argues against it being a variant of much concern, considering how easily we managed to end the second wave here without vaccines or strict lockdown measures. Gyms, restaurants, hairdressers, and shops were all open. Borders were open, no travel bans, taxis and malls were full. In fact, indoor venues were busier than normal because some outdoor areas like parks and beaches were closed. Simply by wearing masks and limiting large crowds South Africa was able to contain this variant effectively, which should give us hope that a new variant should not necessarily be of major concern.

At the time of writing this the official Covid statistics for South Africa are as follows:

- Total population in the RSA: just over 60 million
- Total number of cases since the outbreak: 1,590,370
- Number of people recovered: 1.52 million
- Deaths: 54,735 (i.e. 3.4 % of the number of alleged cases)
- The average number of positive tests over the last seven days is 5.3% of those tested. This figure peaked on January 13 at 27.9%. It thus seems that the number of cases is slowing down considerably.

Worldwide, the total number of cases are 158 million and the total number of deaths is 3.29 million.

So, we do not believe that there is any reason to panic over South Africa—at least not at this stage.

In any event, we take the official figures with a pinch of salt. There seems to be a global effort to overstate the Covid-19 deaths. One no longer hear of deaths as a result of heart attacks, aids, pneumonia, etc.—it's all just Covid-19. The CDC has apparently also admitted that only 6% of their Covid death figures are really due to Covid; the rest are all from other causes. The purpose of these overstatements is unclear but probably has to do with a sinister attempt to control people through fear.

As far as we are concerned the Spanish flue of 1918 was a pandemic, and the Black Death (i.e. bubonic plague) of 1346 to 1353 was a pandemic; this Covid thing is not a pandemic although it is obviously a serious strain of flu that goes around each and every year.

We understand that United Airlines will launch a daily Newark-Johannesburg service on June 3, provided government does not block it.

**Outlook for 2021.** We look forward to rest of the season, to making new friends, to sharing some good laughs around the campfire, and to taking some fine trophies. We just wish to remind those coming to hunt with us, to clear the use of their credit cards with their banks beforehand as we have found that banks often refuse overseas transactions if they have not been forewarned about the use of the card in another country.

We are already taking bookings for 2022 and 2023. So, please let us know if you are interested in hunting the "dark continent" within the next two years.
