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### From the President's Desk

President's Report by Andrew Cotraccia

Greetings NYB Members,

I hope you had an exciting and fulfilling hunting season and that your freezers are filled to the max with nutritious wild game! I would have to say I probably saw fewer deer this season than in years past but my game cameras are showing an interesting and consistent trend of more bucks than doe. I'm hoping the years of quality deer & doe management are starting to pay off. I did have the



pleasure of hunting with my brother in-law Aaron Barton out on our Iowa lease this past season. Even though I didn't draw a buck tag, I drove out to Iowa with him for "moral support." We left NY on Thursday night, got out to Iowa on Friday afternoon and started scouting. Shotgun B season opened Saturday morning and Aaron was quick to connect on a beautiful 150" ten point at around 8:30am. So, we tagged, field dressed, skinned, quartered, and deboned the rest of the day. That night, we packed up our gear, got some rest and headed back home to NY on Sunday morning. For about 2 hours of hunting, we drove approximately 30 hours but, that's how it goes sometimes and Aaron was pretty excited for his first successful Iowa hunt.

If you are not aware, there are two bills, S7747 & A1299, in the New York State Environmental Conservation Committee related to expanding crossbow hunting opportunities. See the Legislative Report in this issue for more information.



The continued drive to overtake the entire bow season shouldn't come as a surprise to anyone! Just look at

what's happening in the rest of our country with lowering standards for the sake of "inclusion" and pushing for instant gratification. This is no different. Our opposition is well funded by crossbow manufacturers who want to sell into New York and makes no excuses about what they make or what they are trying to do. Just look at Ravin and Excalibur crossbows as some of the many examples of crossbows that give hunters a significant advantage over hand held/hand drawn bows. Most advertisements emphasize superior range, accuracy, ease of use, tactical style scopes, adjustable triggers, etc. and are marketed to gun hunters for multi-season hunting opportunities. The argument that crossbows are comparable to hand held/hand drawn bows holds little weight anymore. As a result, the crossbow crowd has started to change their tactics as technology has outpaced their ability to conceal the truth. Now, their argument is about a hunter's right to choose the implement of their choice! And only an anti-hunting life member of PETA could argue with that right? If someone can't use facts, reasoning, and evidence to create a compelling case for or against something, they will often fall back on an emotional appeal. If you don't believe me, then just watch CNN for 10 minutes.

Crossbows are effective hunting tools and have their place in hunting season. The archery season, however, was originally placed before other seasons and given its length because it was an accepted fact that bow hunters needed additional days of hunting undisturbed deer to have an opportunity at a close-range encounter. This is one of the many reasons why bow hunting seasons are under attack. As long as there is a push for full crossbow inclusion, without restriction and separation, NYB will be there to push back!

### "Outdoor Show Cancelled...Again"

For the second consecutive year, the show most of us refer to simply as "The Rockland Show" or "RCCC" has been cancelled due to Covid restrictions and (or) fear of same. The show promoter reported too many vendors were hesitant to commit within the deadline date. The major issue stated was fear that too many attendees would refuse to attend a venue where either mandatory mask or vaccine policies might still be in effect. There was no indication that the Governor was planning to lift restrictions, which even if that did occur, the school itself might implement their own restrictive policies.

Nonetheless, what this means to NYB is that for the second year in a row, our organization will suffer a reduction in new and renewing members. We usually get over 100 memberships at the annual RCCC Show! For the seventeen years NYB has had a presence at RCCC, on two occasions we had over 300 sign up over the four-day show!

I ask that everyone reading this, whether or not you annually renew at the "Rockland" show, to please renew your membership today. Your membership term will be added on to your existing expiration date. Regardless of when you are due to renew, this added revenue will help NYB at this time, and reduce postage costs in future renewal notices. You can call it in to the office (585 229-7468), take care of it online or mail it in. If you use the online method, consider selecting the "Automatic Renewal" option which will save you time and NYB postage. With the decline of so many outdoor shows over the last twenty years, NYB now must rely on each of us personally to recruit and retain members. Roughly 40% or more of members fail to renew each year, often simply an oversight. Do what you can to ensure everyone in your bowhunting circles are current NYB members. Consider signing them up as a gift for helping you hang stands, drag deer, scout, share their spots, or just being a dedicated bowhunter! If you don't feel comfortable explaining all the benefits every bowhunter in NY enjoys as a result of the thirty plus years that NYB has been fighting for them, have them contact me and I'll explain it!

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Greetings from Region 7!

Hope everyone is having a good start to the year.

We are well underway toward the May turkey season for all those gearing up to archery hunt them. I have seen more and more each year in the region. I would say we are getting closer to the numbers of birds we had when I first started hunting them almost 20 years ago. There have been some quiet springs in the past 10 years and I couldn't quite say if it were for my lack of trying, luck, or just plain low numbers due to predation, low poult success, or disease, but I still haven't been lucky enough to connect with my bow yet. In New York, I feel like the ground blind and the right decoy spread is the best technique. With enough scouting, some decent calling and a little luck anyone should have at least one opportunity!

Shed antlers have also been starting to show up! It is a fantastic time to get to know "your" deer herd. Hiking and counting tracks, figuring out core winter/spring areas, and if you're lucky enough, finding the elusive white gold, may all help in measuring success next fall. You can realistically set your goals based on what you find this time of year - be it

targeting does in the early season or playing the cat and mouse game with mature bucks. Let's face it - not every property is going to hold bucks, let alone four plus year olds, year in and year out (or decade for that matter). But getting out and collecting this data could help!

I'm sitting down to write this report having just come in from taking my dogs out. It's 30 degrees with a light snow coming down on top of about a foot of crusted-over snow that's on the ground. This winter has been more typical of winters of the past with the amount of snow and low temperatures we have had and the good news is the birds are singing! Although winter has been tough the wildlife in our part of the state seem to be faring well from what I can see. Several flocks of turkeys and dozens of deer are gathering daily in the cut corn and soy bean fields around home. If you have areas that deer gather in the winter, once the snow melts it is time to start looking for shed antlers. I like to wait until the snow is gone as to not pressure the wildlife. Last spring was first for me finding a matched pair of sheds in a deer bed under a hemlock. More typically I find one side and spend countless hours looking for the match only to never find it. It's a great feeling to pick up a shed knowing the deer made it through winter and likely will be around again come fall. Besides looking for sheds, spring is the time to start scouting for fall. Deer trails, rubs, scrapes, escape routes, terrain change and bedding areas are all very apparent in addition to fresh sign. Once the woods green up this sign quickly disappears and it becomes much harder to read the woods.

Spring brings a new start and is great time to look up 3D archery shoots in your area. It feels great to get out and walk the courses with friends new and old, talking about last fall's adventures and plans for the coming year. Maybe you even have some new gear to try out and familiarize yourself with before hunting season comes. The weather in March and April with muddy trails and cool temperatures allows us to dress

and practice with hunting clothes on, unlike when shooting during the heat of summer.

Spring also brings turkey season! This spring will be my 42nd season chasing turkeys and I'm still like a kid on Christmas Eve when I hear that first gobble! I have never taken a turkey with my bow although I have attempted to draw my bow on a few in the fall while deer hunting, always getting spotted drawing. I keep telling myself one day I will hunt all spring with my longbow and no blind but then grab the shotgun. My hats off to the hunters that pursue turkeys with stick and string and I know more than few NYB members who have been successful.

I encourage everyone to introduce a youth (or anyone for that matter) to archery. With our busy lifestyles we need to take the time to introduce people to the sport we love so much. Have you ever seen the look on someone's face the first time they draw a bow, release the arrow and it hits the target? I have and it's priceless. Never once have I seen someone be anything less than ecstatic. I read somewhere "teach your kids to hunt and you'll never hunt for your kids".



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

### Legislative Report -Spring 2022

Greetings NYB Members,

I wanted to make you aware, that once again, some NYS Legislators have introduced bills in both the Senate and Assembly to further conceal the differences between handheld/hand drawn bows and crossbows. If passed, these bill will further degrade the archery hunting experience in NYS.

Senate Bill S7747 & Assembly Bill A1299 have been introduced in the Environmental Conservation Committees. The full text of the proposed changes can be found at:

### NY State Senate Bill S7747 (nysenate.gov)

### NY State Assembly Bill A1299 (nysenate.gov)

Many members have contacted NYB to express their disapproval for some or all of these proposals and there is much to be concerned about:

- 1. Further expansion of crossbow hunting in special archery seasons
- Allowing hunters to purchase a bowhunting privilege, instead of a muzzle-loading privilege, in order to crossbow hunt.
- 3. Redefining a crossbow bolt as an "arrow."
- 4. Removing the minimum crossbow limb width restriction.
- 5. Removing the maximum draw weight restriction.
- 6. Lowering the dwelling crossbow discharge requirement from 250 feet to 150 feet.

New York Bowhunters does not deny the effectiveness or ease of use of modern crossbows. NYB has always maintained that there should be a clear distinction and separation between implements of superior capabilities and hand held/hand drawn bows. Can anyone deny the superiority of modern crossbows?

The archery season was originally placed before the regular season and given its length because it was an accepted fact that bowhunters needed additional days of hunting undisturbed deer to have an opportunity at a close-range encounter. This is one of the many reasons why bowhunting seasons are under attack.

As long as there is a push for full crossbow inclusion, without restriction and separation, NYB will be there to push back!





# Dad's Jast Deer

Our dad passed away in August of 2020. We were very blessed that we were able to bring him home and be with him during his final days. Our dad was more than a father. He was a friend and a life-long hunting partner. We hunted together for over 40 years. He passed on his savvy bowhunting and woodsman skills to us. The time we spent chasing the illusive whitetail will forever be etched into our memories.

Last bowhunting season was the first we were without him. His loss didn't hit us as hard as we thought it would. Don't get me wrong, we did miss him.

But this bowhunting season, his loss really hit us hard. One day over the summer, as we prepared for the upcoming bowhunting season shooting our bows, we had to stop. As the memories of pre-seasoning rituals flooded back to us, we realized that we would never share them again with Dad. It felt like we got gut punched. The sadness we felt settled deep in our souls. So, to help us heal, we thought we would share a story about dad's last deer.

It was the first weekend in November 2014. Don rolled out from under his warm covers around 4 am and climbed down out of the loft. He headed to the kitchen, made coffee, and started breakfast. About 15 minutes later, Dad popped out of his room, covered only in his white Fruit of the Loom briefs and gruffed "Don't burn the bacon this time," as he headed to the bathroom.

By the time he finished his morning bathroom ritual, his breakfast was waiting for him, less the burnt bacon. We finished breakfast, pounded down our last cups of coffee, dressed, and headed out for the morning hunt.

It was a perfect, cold, windless, cloudy November morning. The temperature hovering around 30 degrees. The three of us headed down the dirt road, jumped the ditch and entered the woods. After a 30-minute walk, we came to the ground blind that we had prepared for Dad. He no longer was able to safely hunt from a tree stand. After getting him set up, we headed to our stands.

About an hour later, Don heard a commotion in the hedgerow behind him. It sounded like a couple of deer coming. Don listened intently for a moment and then slowly turned and caught a movement. It took a couple of seconds, but he realized that it was Dad. He let out a whistle and waved his hands. It took a second, but Dad caught his movement and headed directly to his stand. As he approached, Don climbed down and hit the ground just as Dad arrived. Don

saw the excited look on Dad's face. In a quiet, but excited voice, Dad told him he had shot a deer. Don stood there and took in his story.

Dad shared his tale; "I was sitting, enjoying the morning when I saw this spike coming up the hill. He got 20 yards from me; unaware I was there. He turned broadside at 15 yards. I pulled up and shot. I know I hit him, but not sure where, it happened so fast. I think he ran down into the ravine. We got us a tough track ahead of us." Don saw the concern creep into his face. He nudged Dad on his shoulder and said: "If he is down, we will find him."

They headed to Rick's stand, grabbed him, and backtracked to Dad's ground blind. Dad repeated his story and then pointed to where he was and where the deer was when he shot it. We gave the area a quick glance. Off to the right, about 10 yards from where he claimed the deer was standing, Rick saw a white clump. He narrowed his eyes and quickly realized that it was the belly of a deer. Rick pointed the spot out to Don than gave Dad a poke and pointed. It took a few seconds, but finally Dad saw his treasure laying there. After he did a double check, we could see the worry in his face drain and replaced with joy. He grinned, gave us a high five and headed over to field dress the deer, almost falling face first as his feet couldn't keep pace with his excitement.

Our Dad hunted for a couple more years after that hunt, but that was the last deer he shot. We can't express the gratitude that we have that we were with him when his last arrow flew and hit its mark. ### Tale of a Good Miss

It happens to every hunter. Your nerves get the best of you. Regardless of whether you use a bow, muzzleloader or rifle, buck fever sets in and you miss. It doesn't matter how many hours you practice, what angle you shoot at, or the distance. It could be 10 yards or 100 yards – a miss is a miss. But what is a good miss?

I decided to set up a new stand on the back side of our property, down in a swampy brush covered area that has apple trees and two streams surrounding it. I cleared the area of undergrowth and figured it would be a good place to try some "Throw and Grow" seed to see what would happen along this heavily traveled area.

I got to my stand one afternoon, perfect for the evening watch. Then it happened. The buck took a couple more steps from that tree – and started to move- quartering away - perfect – still doesn't see me - now's my chance. I came to full draw, and in a blink of an eye my arrow flew through the air and hit its mark. I could see the nock glowing red and my heart was pounding even harder. Now I'm confused. Really,

did I just do that? Say it isn't so...Wow, yup, sure did, a clean miss. I watched the 8 pointer walk away from me with not even a white flag to add insult to my injured ego. He just walked away like nothing happened. Just a clean miss.

After I regained my composure, dried my tears, cussed myself out, swore off



archery all together (for that day) I got down from my stand to retrieve my arrow, the glow red dot of misery. I decided to check the distance. As if the archery world decided to give me one last slap in the face I discovered what I thought was 30 yards was actually 35 yards and on a small enough incline to make a difference. Yes, a real good miss.

I did not see that buck on stand again (although I saw my fair share of does) even though I sat in that stand numerous times during the season. He did grace my presence (on trial camera) just to mock me and let me know he was still around. Until we meet again, my friend, now I know – 20, 25, 30 and 35 yards – I have it marked.

I'm already planning for next year...


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


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
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### Listen to your wife

I hunt three different properties that are located near the home I share with my wife, Susan, in Bethel, New York (in Sullivan County). One of the properties is in zone 3-H, the other two are in zone 3-K. I drew a doe tag for the 3-H zone (and did not draw a doe permit for zone 3-K), so my plan for Hunting Season 2021 was to first hunt for a doe and then hunt for a good buck (after I got some new venison in the freezer). I was busy with work early in the Archery season so I didn't get a lot of opportunities to hunt for my doe.

I started my 2021 hunting season on Susan's family's 200acre dairy farm in zone 3-H. Susan's family farm always had a good supply of does. The farm is located five miles from our home. The farm gets very little hunting pressure during October and early November and only one other person hunts during the rifle season. The plan was to kill a doe on the farm and then hunt my hunting club and the Otto family home property, which although is only 18 acres, is still good hunting. I decided that I would have a better chance at a good buck on these two properties than on the farm when the rut kicked in.

Well, you know how it goes when you think it is going to be easy (it is never easy with the bow). I never did get a doe on the farm. I had some does in range, but none offered a shot. Before I knew it, the first week of November and the start of the rut was upon us.

Saturday evening, November 6th, I told Susan I will hunt the farm one last time and then I will switch my focus to a hunting a respectable buck. Susan said to me "What are

you doing? Forget about a doe, concentrate on a buck." However, I was still hell bent on killing a doe.

The first Sunday of November, the 7th, was the day we moved the clocks back an hour. I left our Bethel house at 5:00 am to hunt the family farm. It was a perfect November hunting morning. The sun would soon be shining and it was bitter cold. Susan was still sleeping at our house. I have a cell phone, but it is an oldfashioned flip phone. I am not into texting, and when I hunt, I generally keep my

cellphone with easy access, on vibrate, in my backpack.

At daylight, I had a small eight-point buck come past my stand, but it was not a deer I wanted. I watched him hunting for a doe (just like me). And just like me, he couldn't find one.

It was about one hour into the hunt when I heard someone calling in the distance. I thought the person was calling for a dog. The sound was getting closer to me and now I could hear someone calling, Ray, Ray. I thought that this could only be bad news, so I dug into my backpack for my classic flip-phone (which was on vibrate). I saw that Susan had tried to call me several times. Just then, I saw her at the back end of the field I was hunting. I called her on the phone, she answered by yelling "I saw a big buck below the Otto family house! The biggest buck I ever saw! Get home!" I said that there is nothing I can do about it now. By the time I got home, he will be gone. She said, "get home!" I hung up the phone and thought about what happened. I thought to myself, "My God, she couldn't get me on my phone, so came looking for me, not knowing exactly where I was on a 200-acre farm." I couldn't let her down after what she went through to tell me.

I got down out of my tree stand and headed home. As I traveled, I started thinking this must be a new buck I hadn't seen yet. There must be a doe in heat. Wow! This could work. He could hang around for a few days. When I got home, Susan showed me the direction he went. It was


perfect! I have a tree stand in that area, and a new scrape was near my stand. I wanted a cup of coffee, but said, I better get down there. I checked the wind, and all was good. I got into my stand with that feeling something good was going to happen. The conditions were perfect. No wind. It was about 25 degrees. I was ready to stay there all day. I was prepared with a bottle of water on me and some candy bars.

About 20 minutes went by when I saw a deer coming my way. I glassed him and right away I knew this is the buck Susan had seen. On his travel route, I knew that I would have a good chance of a shot. He was coming in a fast walk. He got about 25 yards from me. I came to full draw, but when he came to where I could shoot, he turned and gave me a poor angle, so I didn't take the shot. He went another 20 yards and turned toward me and came right to the scrape, only 15 yards from me. He just stood there behind too many branches to shoot. He was not working the scrape. He just

stood there. An agonizing three or four minutes passed. Finally he moved out from the branches and gave me the shot. My arrow flew true and I watched him drop. I couldn't wait to get to the house and tell Susan that I got her deer.

I have been bow hunting all of my life and have bow hunted from here to Alaska. This hunt was right up there with my most exciting hunts because Susan was my guide. No drug could give you the feeling Susan and I felt that morning. This deer ended up being my best NY buck ever, scoring 131 P&Y and dressing out at 170 pounds. And all because... "I listened to my wife!"

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
