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From the President's Desk

I would also like to thank our Guest Speaker Gene Hopkins for accommodating our last minute speaker change, everyone who donated to our auction and raffle, the Tupper Lake crew who coordinated the Friday Night BBQ event and



helped all weekend, the Browns who made the amazing desserts again this year, the Brewers, the Comptons and everyone who helped out at registration, with ticket sales, those who helped run the novelty shoots, Ed Gorch for countless hours spent this year and past years setting up and coordinating, the entire staff at Sunny Hill and Annie Jacob's who held us all accountable.

I can promise you there isn't a more dedicated and selfless group of people I've ever met in my life. Each and every one of our members inspires us to serve the bowhunters of NY. We are all volunteers. I can assure you that we don't serve NYB because we have an excess of time and energy. We have a passion for bowhunting and for helping each other. Some people on the Board probably spend more time with NYB business then they do actually bowhunting and I wish we had more time to spend with each other outside of NYB. I commend all NYB members for taking a stand and preserving the sanctity of our sport. If you don't know what NYB has done for you lately, go to our website and check out our Accomplishments section. It spans 32 years and is a testament to the hard work, dedication, and commitment of NYB's past and current leaders.

Legislatively, we've been active with the precious time we do have. Most recently, there are several bills, S3191 & A2940, among others, in the New York State Environmental Conservation Committee related to expanding crossbow hunting opportunities which include:

- 1. Further expansion of crossbow hunting in special archery seasons.
- 2. Allowing hunters to purchase a bowhunting privilege, instead of a muzzle-loading privilege, in order to crossbow hunt.
- 3. It removes the minimum crossbow limb width restriction.
- 4. Removes the maximum draw weight restriction.

5. And lowers the dwelling crossbow discharge requirement from 250 feet to 150 feet, to name a few.


The continued drive to overtake and change the entire bow season shouldn't come as a surprise to anyone! It's special, unique, and challenging, thereby making it valuable. Our opposition exists for one purpose only: they are focused and wellfunded by crossbow manufacturers who want to sell into New York. As most of you very well know, crossbow advertisements emphasize superior range, accuracy, ease of use, tactical style scopes, adjustable triggers, etc. and are marketed at gun hunters for multi-season hunting opportunities. The argument that crossbows are comparable to hand held/hand drawn bows holds little weight anymore. As a result, our opposition has started to change their tactics as technology has outpaced their ability to conceal the truth. Now, their only argument is focused on a hunter's right to choose whatever implement they want! This is an effective angle of attack as it appeals mainly to one's emotions about their freedoms or the lack thereof. If you think about this logically, where would this argument end? Why not have one general season where anything can be used to hunt deer? Why not hunt deer all year long? Why not apply it to other areas of life? I could go on and on. Our opposition regularly criticizes us in public as "anti-American, tyrant, elitist, anti-hunters," all because we have a difference of opinion on one thing. It's unfortunate as I would like to think that we probably agree on 95% of other outdoor and political issues. Think of the mindset of an individual who doesn't get their way and has to resort to name calling. It's pretty childish and that is why we typically don't engage with those types of people. NYB doesn't send daily/weekly emails to our membership on purpose. So, if you get an alert from us, take it seriously and act upon it. It only takes several minutes.

NYB is only successful if our members continue to stay involved!

Asian Venison

Serves 6-8



Ingredients

2 lbs ground venison

1/2 cup coarsely chopped onion3/4 cup coarsely chopped bell peppers

2 cup coarsely chopped bell celery

- 1 lg can chinese vegetables, drained
- 1 small can water chestnuts, drained

1/2 cup soy sauce

Dash crushed red peper

- 1 small can sliced mushrooms or 1 cup freshly chopped
- 1 cup non-quick rice
- (long grain, jasmine, etc)
- 2 cups water
- 1 1/2 cups pecan halves (or other nut)
- 2 cubes beef bouillon
- 1 can cream of mushroom soup
- 1 package chow mein noodles

Preparation

- 1. Preheat oven to 350°F
- 2. In a large skillet, brown venison (add butter or sesame oil if needed to keep meat moist).
- 3. In a large bowl, mix onions, peppers, celery, vegetables, soy sauce, hot petter, mushrooms and uncooked rice.
- 4. Add mushroom soup, water and bouillon to the venison and heat until well mixed.
- 5. Add vegetables to the heated mixture, stir well.
- 6. Pour contents into a 9 x 13 glass baking dish and cover with foil. Bake 45 minutes.
- 7. Uncover and pour noodles over the dish.
- 8. Bake uncovered 20-25 minutes or until rice is tender.



Spring is here and so is turkey hunting! For many of you, this may not be as big of a deal. Here in Region 1, DEC announced our first-ever spring turkey hunting from May 1-May 31.

Long Island is probably not the first place that comes to mind when thinking of turkey hunting, but it actually offers some excellent opportunities. With a mix of public and private lands and a growing turkey population, one of the main reasons Long Island has become a prime destination for turkey hunting is the abundance of public land available for hunting. The New York State Department of Environmental Conservation (DEC) manages several wildlife management areas on Long Island that are open to hunting, including Rocky Point Natural Resources Management Area, Otis Pike Preserve, and David A. Sarnoff Pine Barrens Preserve. These areas offer a mix of forested and open terrain, providing excellent opportunities for turkey hunting.

A notable advantage of turkey hunting on Long Island is the growing population of wild turkeys. According to the DEC, the turkey population on Long Island has been steadily increasing over the past decade, with an estimated 3,500 birds

I hope many of you were able to attend the recent Banquet & Rendezvous. Unfortunately, I had to miss it due to personal reasons. Cornell works with the DEC quite often on research projects including scientific testing, hunter opinion surveys, etc. NYB has assisted the Cornell Wildlife Team on several occasions over the past decade. The objective of the most recent study was to gain feedback from hunters on their thoughts regarding antlerless deer hunting and to gather ideas on encouraging a higher antlerless harvest where warranted. I have been part of several of these group sessions and it always amazes me how knowledgeable (and passionate) NYB members are. These are the reasons NYB was originally contacted by Cornell when they were seeking intelligent input from experienced hunters. The insights obtained at the recent focus groups will help Cornell develop a hunter survey which will go out to a statewide random sampling of deer hunters in the fall of 2023.

Finally, I am sorry to have to say goodbye to Scott and Tammy Chenevert. They have been part of our loyal NYB family for many years. I bumped into them at one of our Banquet/Rendezvous several years back and ended up becoming shooting partners with Scott both at outdoor 3Ds and indoor leagues at Ti Yogi. And anyone who is familiar with Ti Yogi is also familiar with Tammy, not only for her skills with a bow, but with her cooking and management skills. And "ooh" we'll miss her famous chili! Scott and Tammy, thank you both for all you've done, you are both going to be extremely missed, we wish you the best of luck. PUTNAM COUNTY REPORT

Hello New York Bowhunters!

Here's hoping that you all enjoyed the recently passed turkey season, possibly with a prize gobbler or two! A quick thought about the New York turkey season. As we all know, the turkey season begins on May1st and continues till May 31st. For the last few seasons, I have noticed that most of the strutting activity is occurring in April with very little happening in May. Now I don't know what is causing this (although I have some theories) but we might, as a group, lobby that the season should start earlier. As I said, April? Also, if you are out there in the woods during the warm months, please be careful of the huge boost in the tick population. To avoid tick bites, remember, ticks live in grassy, brushy or wooded areas or even on your pets. According to the CDC (Centers for Disease Control and prevention) to avoid ticks, treat your clothing and gear with products containing 0.5% permethrin. Or use products containing DEET. When possible, wear light color clothes so they are visible and tuck in your clothes as much as possible. If you find a tick attached to your skin, simply remove the tick as soon as possible. There are several tick removal devices on the market, but a plain set

of fine-tipped tweezers works very well. Here are some tips on how to remove ticks.

1) Use clean, fine-tipped tweezers to grasp the tick as close to the skin's surface as possible.

2) Pull upward with steady, even pressure. Don't twist or jerk the tick; this can cause the mouth-parts to break off and remain in the skin. If this happens, remove the mouth-parts with tweezers. If you cannot remove the mouth easily with tweezers, leave it alone and let the skin heal.

3) After removing the tick, thoroughly clean the bite area and your hands with rubbing alcohol or soap and water.

4) Never crush a tick with your fingers. Dispose of a live tick by

Putting it in alcohol,

Placing it in a sealed bag/container,

Wrapping it tightly in tape, or

Flushing it down the toilet.

And remember: IF A RASH DEVELOPS SEE A DOCTOR.

Hopefully I met you at the recent Banquet/Rendezvous. Remember, it's never too early to start practicing for the upcoming deer season and the best way is to get to some of the many outdoor shoots that are occurring within the state. And get the little ones out there with you.

ORANGE COUNTY REPORT

Greetings from Orange County,

I hope everyone had a safe and successful turkey season. As I sit here writing this on May 1st, I once again continue to see a decline in turkey numbers in our region. 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


Deer Tick Awareness


Have you ever felt a little tickle on your arm and without looking to see what it was, instinctively reach to wipe it away? Your eyes follow your hand by a split second – and then it registers – YIKES, it's a TICK!!

In the last decade, the population of ticks of all kinds has ballooned in the United States. The number of ticks that carry Lyme disease has been on the rise in the Mid-Atlantic States and has skyrocketed throughout the Northeast. Despite its teeny-tiny size, the deer tick, a.k.a. the blacklegged tick (scientists call it *Ixodes scapularis*), has gained a reputation as a serious health problem in many areas of the nation.

Deer ticks are small – smaller than Dog Ticks

The female deer tick and nymphs are the ones that can get you sick when they bite. The males do not actually feed. Lyme disease can be transmitted to people and animals when the tick feeds, allowing the bacteria in the tick to pass into the blood stream of the host.





Not all ticks can make you sick. In many areas, 50% of the ticks are carrying the Lyme disease bacteria. Deer ticks are slow feeders. They often do not start feeding until they have been attached 24 – 48 hours. However, an improperly removed tick can force the contents of the tick's midgut to be injected into the blood stream.

Deer ticks crawl. They usually grab onto people or animals that brush up against plants near ground level, and then they crawl upwards to find a quiet place for their blood meal. Ticks do not fly, jump, hop or swim.

To avoid getting bit by a tick, follow the steps below

- Cover up! Create a physical barrier between you and ticks. Wear long pants, a long-sleeved shirt, socks, and a wide-brimmed hat. Tuck your pant legs into your socks/boots. If you wear shorts, cover your skin with insect repellant.
- Avoid brushing up against long grass, undergrowth, saplings, etc.
- Kill them. Spray your clothes (not but your skin!) with Permethrin. This will kill the ticks.
- Get them off before they bite. Check your body for ticks after time in the woods. They like hidden areas like armpits, etc. Shower soon after spending time outdoors to wash off ones you may have missed.
- Run your clothes in the dryer after time outdoors for about 10 minutes to kill any that might be on your clothing.

What if you do get bitten? Proper removal of the tick is key! See your doctor if needed.

- Use fine-point tweezers to get a hold of the tick as close to the skin surface as possible.
- Pull backwards gently but firmly using an even, steady pressure. Do your best not to jerk or twist. Don't squeeze, crush or puncture the tick's body.
- After removing the tick, wash the skin and your hands thoroughly with soap and water.
- If any mouth parts of the tick remain in the skin, leave them alone; they will expel on their own.

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

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DEC Places Revenue Over Education and Safety -REFUSING TO RE-INSTITUTE MANDATORY IN-PERSON TRAINING TO HUNTER EDUCATION PROGRAMS

The DEC has refused to include the mandatory requirement of live instruction for at least a portion (if not all) of the Bowhunter (and Hunter) Safety Courses. New hunters may purchase hunting licenses with merely an online course. How and why is this still happening?

Several years ago (pre-pandemic), a shortage of volunteer hunter education instructors caused the DEC to research an online option for Hunter and Bowhunter education classes. When the topic came up at instructor refresher classes, existing instructors overwhelmingly expressed their opposition to this idea. NYB on several occasions offered ideas to the DEC, which we felt would have increased instructor numbers, ideas the DEC never followed up with. With the pandemic shutdown in 2020, all in person classes ceased. Eventually the DEC began certifying hunters via an online course. As this resulted in record numbers of new hunters (including nonhunting spouses in many cases for the purpose of gaining an additional tag) the DEC's spin doctors boasted the increase was a result of their diligent promotion of the "wonderful" hunting opportunities in NY. When the DEC finally allowed live classes to resume, they left the online class option. This resulted in very poor attendance at live classes, some actually being dropped due to lack of registrants. To date, most instructors still barely scrape together enough students to run a class.

In 2022, there were 7,064 Online Bowhunting Safety Certifications given out, while only 725 new bowhunters obtained their instruction in a live class!

In fall 2022, the DEC began seeking instructors to teach a new course called "Next Step." This course was for those who completed an online bowhunter education (or hunter, trapping ed) class and would like hands-on experience. The course consists of four hours focusing on safety, hunting techniques, etc. Sound familiar? It's exactly what we taught in our live classes! These Next Step classes are voluntary for hunters and there is no certification attached to them. Although you will never see the DEC acknowledge there is validity to requiring mandatory live instruction, this is their attempt to affix a bandaid to the issue.

Upon seeing this, NYB sent the DEC Hunter Education



Department a request to either eliminate the online courses or at the minimum require at least part of the certification process to have mandatory in-person training. The response did not address the point we were making, which was an online course cannot replace the quality of instruction in a live experience. They actually stated the Next Step course would "...provide valuable experience for students who complete an in-person or online course..." To our point, why is it not mandatory? To our accusation that the DEC was placing revenue over quality and safety, they responded, "...increased license sales...a good thing as all that money goes toward wildlife and DEC/land management..." To this, I again say more revenue may be a good thing but not if acquired by watering down entrance level instruction and certification.

And here is one more piece to the puzzle: All state Fish and Game Departments receive federal funding through the Pittman-Robertson act. This is money collected through additional federal taxes on firearms, ammunition, and archery equipment. These funds are distributed to each state by the feds based on the number of licensed hunters. Yes, more money for conservation projects, etc. is a good thing, but this double dip reward has caused the DEC to increase license sales by eliminating mandatory in-person training. And not all P-R funded conservation projects necessarily go directly towards increasing hunting opportunities.

When the hunter education statistics for 2022 came out and revealed over 90% of the approximately 7,800 new bowhunters obtained their certifications via an online course, NYB once again contacted the DEC. They ignored our offer to meet to discuss the issue. There was a time when the DEC looked for input from the hunting community. They seem to only do this now if it fits their agenda. We expressed concern over inadequate safety training. To this they responded that since the online course began in 2020, there have been 40 HRSI (Hunting Related Shooting Incidents). Thirty-eight of the forty (including 4 fatal) were certified at in-person courses. This is a ridiculous use of a statistic for justifying online courses. Currently, the overwhelming majority of hunters are those who were certified in-person. It stands to reason the majority of HRSI will match this statistically. And although we all agree there should be no HRSI, the fact is there will always be some. Going forward, assuming we never return to in-person classes, eventually the overwhelming majority of hunters will become those certified online and HRSI will reflect that as well.

Proudly, the Bowhunting Safety course that has been taught for the last five decades and currently accepted by all states originated in NY! In the early 1970s, a group of dedicated bowhunters from NY created the first course that eventually spread across the country and led to the creation of the National Bowhunting Education Foundation (NBEF). This is the very (updated) course the DEC still uses. The NBEF still advocates for at least some part of the course be held inperson. So the organization that provides the curriculum and material the DEC uses is being ignored by the same!!!

The sad fact remains that new hunters are not required to attend at least a portion of hunter education in-person. Firearm and bow handling, blood trailing, anatomy training, safe tree stand use, along with the benefits gained from the knowledge of qualified experienced hunters are all impossible to obtain online. The DEC knows this and is trying to get people to voluntarily attend additional live training. As long as there is an option to certify 100% from the comfort of one's home, the DEC is doing a disservice to new hunters and placing all hunters' safety in jeopardy.

All funds raised enable us to promote and protect bowhunting in New York.

The weekend started off with a BBQ Friday evening. We had live music with Ed Gorch Jr. topped of with Michelle Brown's wonderful homemade desserts! The weather that evening could not have been better.

Available all weekend, 17 challenging targets made up our 3D course. It was great to see so many people risk losing an arrow or two as they made their way through the wooded course.

Once again, our can raffle was a huge success! Every year we receive donations from so many generous individuals and companies, and this year was no exception. We thank Black Rifle Coffee again for their huge contribution. Thanks to Ed Gorch's time and effort gathering donations, the can raffle tables were stuffed with great outdoor-related items and more.

Our By-laws call for the organization to hold one annual meeting per year. President Andrew gave a great talk on the current state of our organization and the issues we face. The rest of the board updated the membership on the various committees they represent.

Congratulations to Sean Walp who won the Elk Shoot-off!

Meadow Groom was awarded the Youth of the Year Award.
