Congratulations and thank you to the NYB Board Directors for their continued support and for carrying the organization another year: Greg Masaitis, Bob Brown, Ed Gorch, Merritt Compton, Bill Snyder, Al Bottari, Kathy Savage, Richard Kirschner, Mike Farrugia, Annie Jacobs, Bob Ledrich, Aaron Barton, Cindy Phillips, and Sammy Divietro. I can promise you there isn't a more dedicated and selfless group of people I've ever met in my entire life. Each and every one of our members inspires us to serve because we are all volunteers. Some of our Directors have been serving NYB for years; others have been for decades. We have a passion for bowhunting and for helping each other, but it's getting harder and harder. We desperately need new people to step up and continue the tradition. I'm concerned for the future of bowhunting in NYS because volunteerism is way down. I read a very interesting article about how high school and college students are less likely to volunteer or give to charity today than they were 15 years ago. The U.S. Surgeon General declared that there is an epidemic of loneliness and isolation with nearly 50% of young adults experiencing loneliness. It's no wonder since our country has never been more divided or polarized. The author makes an interesting correlation between the increase in polarization in society and the decrease in volunteering, saying "volunteering brings people together to solve common problems, whether it's in their community or on a large scale. Working side by side with people [...] helps us see each other's humanity." If we feel we are in the trenches together, it gives us a sense of accomplishment and connection. So, I commend all NYB members for taking a stand and preserving the sanctity of our sport. If you don't know what NYB has done for you lately, go to our website and check out our Accomplishments section. It spans 33 years and is a testament to the hard work, dedication, and commitment of NYB's past and current leaders. Legislatively, we've been active with the precious time we do have. Most recently, there are several bills in the Assembly and Senate Environmental Conservation Committee related to expanding crossbow hunting opportunities. NYB leaders have spoken with our contacts in Albany recently. Thankfully, they do not see any advancement of crossbow legislation coming out of the committee this year. They also mentioned receiving both pro and con phone calls regarding crossbow expansion, and made a point to emphasize that those received against far outnumbered those received that were for. NYB, KEEP IT UP! Ensuring we reach the most influential in Albany has been NYB's focus over the past several years. We are evolving our tactics based on the recommendations of our contacts in Albany but phone calls are still one of the most effective and impactful ways to reach our elected representatives to voice our concerns. Surprisingly, at this point in time, logic and reasoning are ruling this fight. Those on the Encon Committees recognize the advancement of crossbow technology in relation to traditional archery equipment and understand the special nature of our archery season. NYB is only successful if our members continue to stay involved! Thank you and good luck in the woods! Sincerely,







This was the 9th year it was held at Sunny Hill in Greenville, NY. We were all captivated by Colorado's John Gardner's presentation on Saturday night and so appreciate him making the trip for us. Next year's details are not yet planned, but if you have never attended (or have) I urge you to put it on your calendar as soon as it's announced. Personally, it was great seeing all of you in attendance and spending a little time with old friends and new, from all across the entire state (and beyond). You are friends and family with whom we all share the same bowhunting values. I know so many of you from emails and phone calls. It was nice to get together in person. Thank you all for attending and supporting NYB.

2023 Deer Harvest report is available. The entire state showed a decrease from the year before as well as below the five-year average. This includes overall kill, muzzleloader and archery. A very large drop in the antlerless harvest has the DEC looking at ways to motivate hunters to increase the antlerless rate. The state archery take this past season was down to 39,271 from the previous year's 45,333 and down from the five year average of 52,284 (that's a 25% drop!). And in case you are wondering, the crossbow deer take of 2023 showed an increase from previous year in light of all of this. Although a slight increase, it was the only category to go up in kills. Complete breakdowns of zones, counties, etc. can be found online through the NYS DEC website.

Many NYB members also volunteer their time as NYS Hunting Safety Instructors. I noticed the following Region 3 NYB members were recently acknowledged for various instructor service milestones: 40 Year Award to NYB Life member from Westchester, Andrew Szczesniak; 30 Year Award to NYB Life member from Orange, Elman Groom; 20 Year Award to Alfred Grimaldi (Al, I see you moved down south, it's great to see you sticking with NYB); 15 Year Award to NYB Benefactor member from Westchester, Carmine Marranzino (nice Hancock deer last year pal!); and a 5 Year Award to Joseph Utera of Ulster County. Thanks to all of you as well as all the other instructors out there. If I am made aware of it, I'll mention you as you achieve your various milestones as well.

Attention New Jersey members: I know NYB has several members who reside in our neighboring state (big thank you for your support). If you enjoy shooting for its own sake, or just want to practice your hunting skills year-round, there are many active archery clubs in NJ. I don't care if you shoot a compound (many of us shoot both), grab a recurve and some arrows and enjoy the eight courses and thousands of passionate archers whom will be gathered at Sawmill Family Ski Center in Morris, PA.


Aim Small, Miss Small – What does this mean to Archers?

Aim small, miss small is a popular phrase often used in the context of archery, shooting, and other precision sports. (*Interesting fact - legendary golf instructor Harvey Penick coined the phrase back in the 1930s. American snipers have adopted it and use it as a mantra for better accuracy.*) The idea behind this mantra is to aim at a small target within a larger one, with the goal of hitting the small target with any near miss still being effective. This means when you focus on a tiny spot, if you miss, your arrow will be closer to the target than if you had aimed for a general, larger area. This approach is believed to improve accuracy and precision, as it requires the archer to focus on a specific point and ignore the surrounding area.

In archery, aiming small resulting in "miss small" can be achieved by focusing on a specific spot on the target, such as the center of the bullseye, a small ring within the target or the "magic marble" in a game animal. This approach helps to reduce the margin of error and increase the chances of hitting the desired spot. By aiming at a small target, archers can develop a more precise and controlled shot, which can lead to improved score, more kills and better overall performance.

As bowhunters our goal is a quick kill with a fast recovery. If we can practice for this scenario and accomplish it afield we would consider our hunt "successful." So how exactly do we accomplish this?

First we need to understand deer anatomy and shot angle to aim for the small spot on the game animal. While there is more to this than can fit in this article, the main point is to imagine a marble on the inside of the deer located about halfway down the body, in line with the front leg (a.k.a. The "magic marble").



Secondly we need to practice shooting at a marble-sized point within our target. It might be the center of the bulleye, the inner ring on a target or the kill-zone on a 3D target.

Finally focus on the target rather than the sight. The sight is just a reference point to help you aim, but the target is the ultimate goal. By focusing on the target, you can maintain a steady and consistent aim, which is essential for accuracy.

tuned up and ready to go. Importantly, check those bow strings and cables for wear. If they seem a little bit worn, have them replaced. A broken string or cable can be extremely dangerous. And, while you're at it, check your limbs for any cracks or wear.

On another note, I don't know if it's just me, but I have hardly seen any deer in my neck of the woods and my backyard is Fahnestock State Park. Whether it is in my backyard or driving up and down Peekskill Hollow Road, I have not seen a single deer in approximately one year. In speaking with Mike at Flying Arrow Sports in Carmel he is telling me that everyone is complaining of the same thing. Most are saying that EHD is playing a big part. In walking around Fahnestock I have not come across a single carcass. However, almost every night I hear the coyotes howling right in back of my house, which leads me to believe that the coyotes are having a big impact on our Putnam deer herd. And just remember, coyote season runs from October right up until the end of March.

Be safe out there and also take your son, daughter, niece, nephew, grandchild out into the woods with you. The time spent with them will not be forgotten by you or them.

ORANGE COUNTY

Hello fellow Orange County friends,

As I write this Turkey season has been underway for weeks. I hope those of you who were out there had as much action as I did. Congratulations are in order for Orange County member, Jeff Davis for his "Recurve Bow - Opening Hour Bird." Rich says I should refer to you as the "Turkey Whisperer!" Many members reported they felt the turkey activity was a little better than recent years...we'll see.

Switching gears to deer hunting, the 2023 Harvest report came out. Orange County fared as follows and as compared to previous year: Total deer taken was 4,237 which was down approximately 500 from previous year. Adult male, 2,181 (down from 2,217). Male fawn, 198 (down from 249). Adult female, 1,654 (down from 2,057), female fawn, 204 (down from 215). As you can see the biggest drop was in adult female which corresponds with the entire state. The trend of the antlerless take decrease is something the DEC would like to change. Several NYB members were asked to be part of an online discussion with a researcher from Cornell Wildlife in an attempt to better understand hunter's attitudes toward the taking of antlerless deer. The takeaway from that meeting as reported to me was that bowhunters are more likely to take a doe early in season, but once the rut starts to approach, they are

more likely to pass up, hoping she will attract a roaming buck.
