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From the President's Desk

Greetings NYB Members,

I hope you had an exciting and fulfilling hunting season and your freezers are filled to the max with nutritious wild game. After three years of bowhunting Montana, I successfully harvested my first elk with my bow which turned out to be a nice 6x6 bull. It was also the very first elk I ever had within bow range. I was definitely in the right place at the right time. It also helped that he came in to about 5 vards which allowed me to make a confident and clean broadside shot. In addition to myself, my dad Gary and our friend Tom also harvested beautiful bulls with another family friend missing his first shot opportunity.

NYB's leaders are preparing for our 34th annual gathering this year and have decided to make a change from our usual Sunny Hill location. The 2025 NYB Rendezvous & 3D Archery Event will be at the Flashing Feathers Bowhunters located in Ithaca, NY. There are various reasons we decided to go in





a different direction this year but we felt that it was in the best interests of New York Bowhunters and our members to change it up a bit. This is our largest fundraising event of the year. All funds generated sustain our organization throughout the entire year.

Legislatively, we are preparing for another year in Albany to meet and educate our elected officials. This year we are focused on bill S00218, related to crossbow hunting. This bill proposes the changes noted below to name a few:

- Allows people 14 and older to hunt with a crossbow during all of archery season.
- Changes the requirement to hunt with a crossbow from the muzzleloader privilege to the archery privilege.
- Removes the minimum width and maximum draw weight restrictions.
- Establishes a minimum overall length of crossbow to be 24 inches.
- Changes discharge setback restrictions from 250' to 150'.
- Allows Jr archery hunters aged 12-13 to hunt with a crossbow during archery

season accompanied by an adult.

NYB has already had a flurry of activity and correspondence related to this bill with our Albany insiders and will be sending out future alerts via email and social media on its status. The two Chairs of the NYS Environmental Conservation Committees remain from 2024. On the Assembly side we have Deborah Glick representing Lower Manhattan. On the Senate side, Pete Harckham represents District 40 which includes Westchester and the Hudson Valley.



SHED HUNTING TIPS FROM NEW SCIENCE

hen you find a nice shed antler you will want to find the other one. But how far away is the matching side and how likely are you to find it? A new study led by Brian Peterson from the University of Nebraska at Kearney studied these questions and the results provided tips to increase your odds of finding matched sets of shed antlers. The findings were published by the National Deer Association on February 5, 2025.

Half of all matched sets in the study were found within 10 paces of each other. This suggests that every time you find a shed, you should stop walking and scan the immediate area carefully. Make increasingly larger circles, searching the ground within a 10- to 15-step radius of the shed before moving on. If you can't find the other one within 15 steps, increase your search area to about 100 yards from the first find. One fourth of sheds in this study were found within 100 yards from the first. If you have onX Hunt app you can track your coverage as you continue your search. The study found the chances of finding the matching antler beyond 100 yards dropped sharply.





REGION 2 REPORT

I am starting off with something a bit controversial. A farm raised, high fence whitetail deer was killed by an individual. The "hunt," or shopping, took place on a trophy ranch in Pennsylvania. The buck was scored by Safari Club International (SCI) at 1,011 inches. This deer was most definitely genetically altered, and by the pictures released, must have had a miserable life. The sheer size and mass of the antlers had to have given him much discomfort and he must have struggled to live a normal life. I, as a hunter with a conscience, cannot fathom why anyone would want to hunt this animal. I have a huge aversion and disdain for high fence hunting to begin with, but this takes it to another level.

There are several crossbow bills floating around Albany. I will keep you informed if any require action. But, it is always good to maintain a relationship with your Senate and Assembly member. It can be very helpful when trying to make an appointment or to educate them on an issue that can affect our Archery Seasons.

In October 2024, at a deer facility in Region 6, CWD was detected. According to the NYS-DEC, this was an isolated incident, detected during a routine check at the facility by NYS Department of Agriculture and Markets (AGM). it was confirmed by the USDA National Veterinary Services Laboratories. There was CWD detected in wild deer

within the area. NYS-DEC will continue to monitor the situation.

NYS has led the Nation on curtailing the spread of CWD.

With Spring arriving, that means more outdoor activities, which means more opportunities for ticks. Please be cautious and take precautions before venturing out. They host a plethora of bad bugaboos.

Remember to spread the NYB word to your fellow bowhunters. We are only as good as our membership, and we rely on you to get the word out. Mentor a new bowhunter, bring them to an NYB event, sign up a relative or coworker.

Until then, pick a spot and enjoy the flight of the arrow.



As I sit here writing this on the 12th of February snow is falling again as we are in the midst of another winter storm. My resident 3 point buck, aka "Bucky," is still holding his antlers, however his buddy sheds half of his rack. It is time to get out and look for sheds, I guess! This is a great time of the year to scout post season and look for fresh sign and get some exercise.

During the 2024 season, NYS harvested 112,224 antlered deer with 97,557 anterless deer. This is a 3.6% decrease in antlered deer and a 15.6% decrease in anterless deer. Orange County harvested 1,692 antlered and 1,092 anterless deer. This resulted in a 1.0:0.6 male to female ratio. On a good note, this year's harvest produced a 70% increase in the bucks taken being 2 years or older.

For the first time in a while we've had some solid ice on the lakes. I've had some successful trips bringing home some tasty perch and crappie in Harriman. Stay warm and safe and remember turkey season is right around the corner! As always, please reach out to me with any concerns or upcoming events in Orange County.


In other news, I had a member reach out to me about the possibility of an archery-only hunting area for WMU 9c. I know it's very hard because that area contains the city






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A LONG JOURNEY ON AN OLD KOAD

You are probably wondering why I chose this title to my story. My son, who has told me numerous times that I'm growing old, gets all the credit. What he didn't know is how many adventures I had left in me.

My elk hunt started with a conversation with my wife and one of her friends at our cabin on a chilly winter night. On this night, my wife's friend's husband happened to be there as we were talking about his elk hunt and I started to pick his brain about the whos, the whats, the wheres and the hows. The next thing I knew, he got off his phone and said, "You're all set, the outfitter will be calling you in the next couple of days to make arrangements with you."

"MMMMM OK??!!" I replied.

To be clear, I am not a high end trophy hunter who can just go on a hunt at the drop of a hat. I have to save. I have to plan. I have to weigh all my options. I have to get a plan of attack. I have to go without (scrimp and scratch for every [extra] dime and dollar) in order to go on a hunt like this.

I am the kind of guy that thinks. I talk to people. I ask their opinion. I talk to my wife, I talk to my son and try to figure out what I can and cannot do or afford. That's when my son said to me, "Dad, you're not getting any younger. You might as well do it now while you can."

Thanks, son (I think). So I did it. I bit the bullet and started down this long old road.

I contacted the outfitter and told him that I wanted to do the elk hunt, but I wanted to do it with my bow. The only way I can afford to do it was to set up some type of payment plan. We came to an agreement, so I was sent a contract to sign and a detailed payment schedule to execute (painful).

I had so many questions and now was the time to seek the answers. I did a lot of research; YouTube and podcasts became my main source of information. The first thing I learned was I need to be in shape for this adventure. Off to the gym I went, 2 to 3 times a week, with a program set for upper body workouts as well as a minimum of 35 minutes of cardio. An added benefit was I dropped 35 pounds in the process.

Since the trip was a year and a half away, I had time to think about the logistics of taking this trip. Would I drive or fly? Should I take 1 or 2 bows? What kind of hunting gear would I need? What can I expect of the weather? All in all, I became obsessed with the details. I decided that the best course of action was to drive. This would allow me to bring everything with me,

including my 4 giant coolers, road snacks (it is a 27 hour drive), 2 bows, 2 foot lockers and a portable target. I ended up renting a 15 passenger van. Yes, I had that much stuff.

My trip started on the 29th of August and I arrived on

the 31st. Check in was at 1500 (3 pm). Perfect, I made it! Let the adventure begin! I get the lay of the land and settled it. My plan was to shoot the bow, get my clothes together, set my rucksack up and get my things in order. 0345 comes quickly!!

3:45 a.m. I am up and ready. 4:30 a.m. I've got the truck loaded up, and we were off. Since this was a 1 on 1 hunt, it was just me and my guide. The sun wasn't even up yet! We get to our location and the guide gave me instructions. He first told me there are 4 rules to remember. Of course I only remembered the first and the last; **Rule 1:** It's your tag. **Rule 4:** Keep your S*!% together. Rules 1 and 4 were the most important so I promptly forgot Rules 2 & 3. I gathered my wits, my ruck and my bow, and down we went, down to the dark timber, down where the Elk roam.

As the sun came up on DAY 1, things looked and sounded promising. I saw a lot of mule deer bouncing around, walking and grazing as they moved. While we were watching and listening to the dark timber wake up, my guide would let out a couple of calls - waiting (and wanting) that bull elk to wake up and announce his presence with authority. That didn't happen. My guide called and called. Finally, off in the distance, we heard a reply. We established an ambush. My guide was behind me and I was maybe a few yards in front. Waiting and watching, watching and waiting. My mind started playing tricks on me - What was that sound? Did you hear that? Where did it come from? Do you have a shooting lane? Is there a clear line of sight? Yes and yea except the elk did not get the memo. He decided he didn't want to play this morning and now it's close to lunchtime. We hiked backed out and returned to the house. The afternoon hunt went pretty much the same way, except I saw 2 black bears 30 yards away! Wow, now this is great! Day 1 came and went with no elk.

DAY 2 started the same as day 1. Rinse and Repeat, except this time, the bull decided he wanted to play. We set up with me in front and the guide 20 yards behind me. I got settled, up against a fallen log, facing up hill, with 4 clear lanes for shooting going from my right to my left. I was ready for elk and did not expect Muley bucks to visit. To make a long and painful story short, I missed a nice 4 by 4 Muley buck. Naturally, I nicked the only tree that was in my shooting lane. I felt terrible but I paid big bucks for an Elk, not a Muley (even thought it would have been a nice bonus). The afternoon went about the same way; walk and stalk, listen and watch. All in all, we hiked an average of 12 miles each day. I saw a lot of mule deer and 5 different black bears. Even with no elk it was still an awesome adventure.

DAY 3 found us in a different location. Here we had open prairies with draws full of thick vegetation, scrub oaks and SHADE (keynote, it was well over 80 degrees and dry; this is key for later). As we spot and stalked the area, we concluded nothing was moving or talking. Since it was too hot for man and beast to do anything productive, we backtracked and left the area, but not before stopping at the ONLY watering holes in the area. Man am I glad we did because there were signs everywhere. With the heat and dry conditions, it was a major gathering place for the thirsty.

We came up with a game plan for the afternoon. I was to hike solo (around a mile or so), get set up on a side of the hill that has Oak trees acting like a barrier providing cover and concealment, and sit. I got into my oak cage early enough to make improvements, cut some limbs down, move some rocks and clear some lanes. I used the rangefinder on significate land features, the closest being 25 yards to the front of the watering tank, and the farthest being 55 yards to the back side of the watering hole. Now the waiting game began.

The afternoon sit was long and hot but at least I was in the shade. Minutes turned into hours, which felt like a complete lifetime. Suddenly things started to happen. Sunset was 1924 (7:24pm) and legal shooting hours ended 30 minutes after sunset. At 1900 I saw movement. Three muley does came out of the draw to my left, and made their way to the watering hole. They were a bit skittish, but still came in. Now I would know if we made the correct choice about this set up. If those does did not see me or get spooked for any reason, we were in business.

As I watched the first set of does walk off into the distance, a second group of 3 does came in and did the same thing. Up to the watering hole they came, looked around, drank and then headed out – perfect! I couldn't ask for anything better. Around the same time as the second set of does walked away, I heard something in the distance. My brain knew this sound, but it just didn't register at first. A split second later, my eyes confirmed what my ears heard; bulls coming down the hill sparring as they walked down towards the water. I was in luck! I still had shooting light (1920ish). The 3 bulls took

turns sparring and walking. They edged closer and closer to my position. One finally broke free and started to walk to the dried up watering hole. He came over the berm that separated the two areas. I watched, eyeing the bull as he started heading to the water. I positioned myself to take the shot, but as my luck would have it, the bull stopped in front of one of the trees that was blocking my shooting lane. I had no clear shot! And I was at full draw! I carefully lowered my bow, guiding my arrow forward, trying to not make a sound. I repositioned myself about 2 inches to my right and come to full draw again. The whole time, the bull was drinking, watching, drinking, lifting his head each time. He took a couple of steps forward and gave me a slightly quartering-to shot, exposing his chest. I released my arrow. SWISH -TWANG - THUMP! The glow of my orange nock lit up the darkening sky and buried itself just above his shoulder angling down! A direct hit! Seconds later I watched my bull double back and run around a mound of trash trees and dirt to his final resting place, right by his fellow bulls. To add insult to injury, those other bulls started sparring with my downed bull! The pressure was off. I stood up and watched, binoculars pressed into my face, struggling to see. The time was now 1945 - lights out. Off in the distance I could see more figures emerge from the shadows. Three more bull elk come out to investigate and one of them was a GAINT!!

I have no regrets. I will take what I got. I beat the odds and came out victorious. I'm now part of that less than 10% of hunters who actually fill their archery elk tag! My bull dressed out at 258 on the hoof. Not too bad if you ask me.



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






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
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
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
